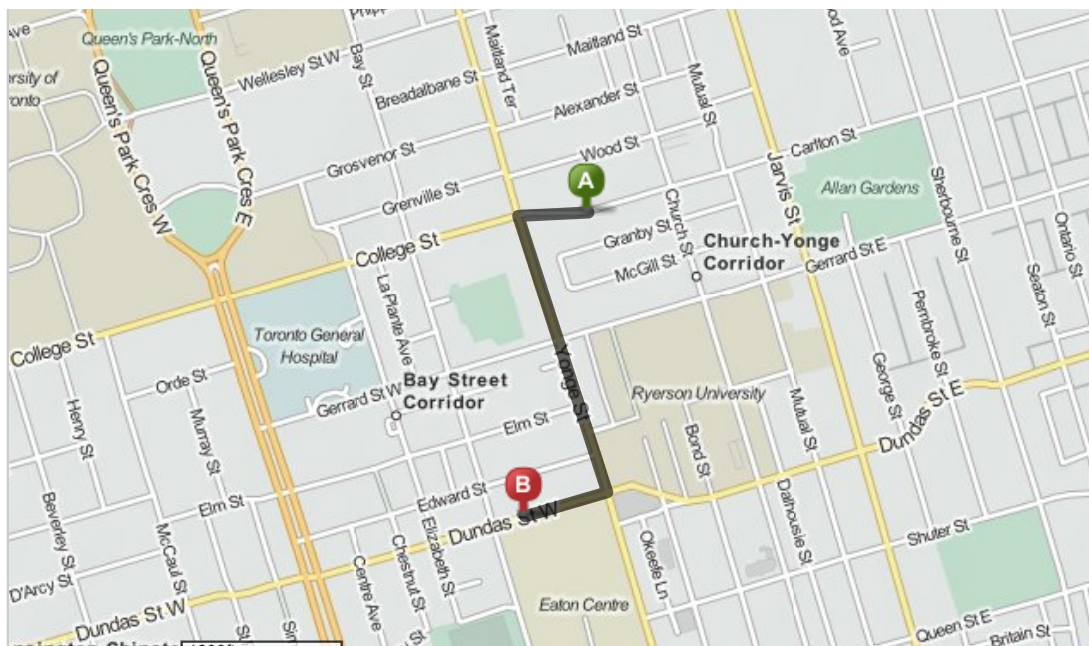

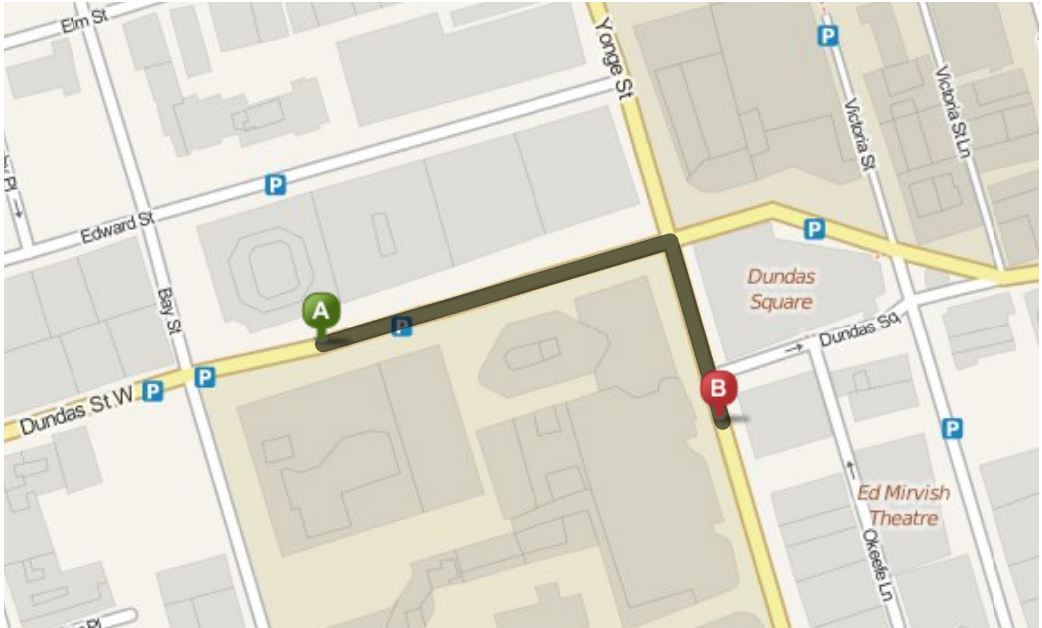

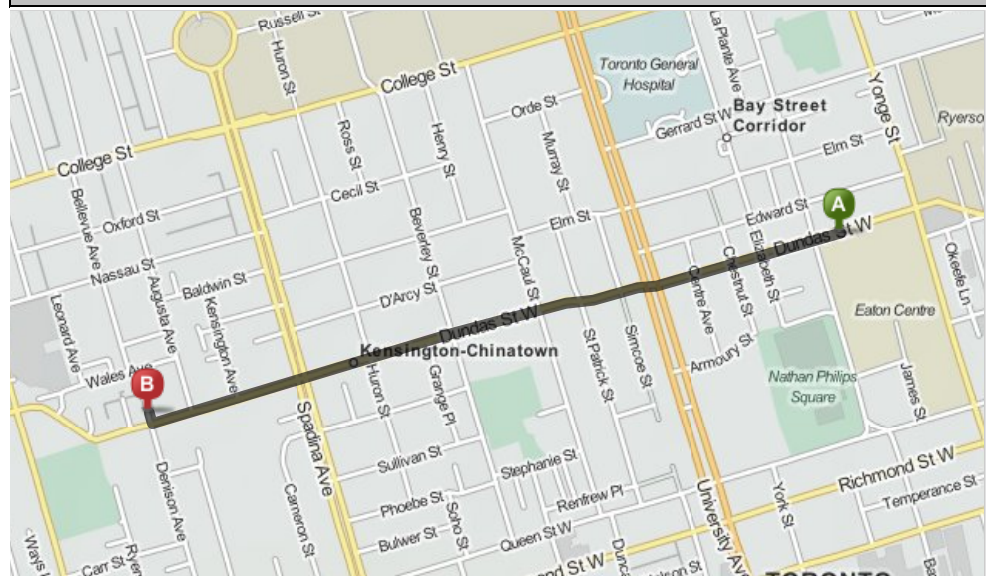
From **The Raging Spoon**. Including baja salad, roasted potato salad, Thai Chicken satay with peanut sauce, fruit, homemade dessert squares and more.
