In Turkey, there is little institutional room for ambiguous or ambivalent sex and gender. The state is active in producing and deploying medicolegal projects that constantly strive to disambiguate the ambiguously sexed and gendered bodies, and recruit them as unambiguous heteronormative national subjects.

In her talk, Dr. Zengin will focus on how the dominant categories of sex and gender gain definition through the formation of violent intimacies and proximities between the Turkish state and transgender people.

Dr. Zengin's research interests include the body, gender, sexuality, queer theory, anthropology of law, medical anthropology, the state, violence, and contemporary issue in the Middle East with a special focus on Turkey.
